Paolo Veronese: The preaching of the Baptist



This work has been in the Borghese collection since 1607 and was probably executed in the ten years from 1560-1570, not long after the famous cycle of frescoes in the Villa Barbaro Volpi at Maser.

In the Preaching of the Baptist the artist, creates a composition whose subtle and bold perspective - the scene takes place on several different levels - is united with a careful counterpointing of colour. The light shades of the colours are truly "sunny" and the delicate drawing which in some points seem to be unfinished, make this painting one of the highlights in the long series of masterpieces by Paolo Veronese.
